Dear Friends

All good gifts around us



You don't need me to tell you it's been a hot, dry summer. As I write, it isn't yet the end of August, but already the Met Office is telling us Summer 2025 is the hottest on record. Grass has gone brown, crops are struggling, if they've survived at all, reservoirs have dried up, leaves are already turning beautiful autumn hues and dropping from the trees. Yet at the beginning of the year we wondered if the sun would ever shine again and the rain would ever stop falling. Rivers were overflowing, crops were flooded, homes were ruined and still the rain fell.

It all adds up to one of the most challenging growing and harvest seasons for a long time, with some farmers saying it's the worst they remember, the worst harvest for a generation. Some crops are high quality. Hay and haylage is extremely good quality but there just isn't very much of it and livestock are already eating into the meagre supply as pastures have dried up. Apples, plums and damsons have thrived, but are small. Broccoli, cabbage and cauliflowers are small and in short supply. We may even have to get used to them being 'wonky' and pay for the privilege. But there is a harvest!

And that is the point. In this part of the world, there is a harvest to celebrate and God has showered us with the gifts we need: to supply, even if food prices go up and fruit and veg look a little different to the supermarket standard.

Of course, food is not the only gift that God gives to us. There are many gifts we can celebrate this Harvest season: the roof over our head; the bed in which we sleep; family members; the companionship of animals; the gift of friendship... the list could go on. Open our eyes, and we will discover there are many gifts around us for which we can give thanks.

Before I finish, there is one more gift I want to give thanks for this year, the gift of shared ministry. In addition to our dedicated Readers, Isobel and Ann, and a number of OWLs (Occasional Worship Leaders), we are blessed in these parishes to enjoy ministry from 3 wise retired Priests; John Malbon, Donald Brockbank and Lesley Bentley.

After 60 years of ordained ministry, 59 of them as Priest, the time has come for John Malbon to step back from public ministry. I know that John will continue to share his considerable gifts, not least his gift of encouragement, but for now, on behalf of us all, I want to say a very Big Thank You to John for the ministry he has so generously shared for almost 25 years of retirement in the Cross Country Parishes. It has been greatly appreciated and has borne a rich harvest. Thank you, John, for being one of God's good gifts to all of us.

Creationtide

Each year, from September 1 to October 4, Christians from many different backgrounds come together in prayer and action to celebrate Creationtide. This is a season that reminds us to care for our Earth. This season is a time to honour God as Creator and to remember our shared calling to love and celebrate everything God has made. At Wettenhall we celebrate Harvest and pray each week through September for our world. We will finish with a special Morning Prayer on 5th October.

As followers of Christ from around the world, we all share a responsibility to care for God's Creation. We are all a part of everything God has made. Our well-being is closely connected with the well-being of our Earth, and this time of reflection and action provides an opportunity to safeguard our common home and all of the countless life forms that share it with us.

This year's theme is "Peace with Creation", inspired by Isaiah 32:14-18. The prophet portrays a desolate Creation, lacking peace due to injustice and the broken relationship between God and humankind. Though God's plan for Creation is rooted in justice and peace, Isaiah implies that human sin disrupts this, leaving Creation in ruin.

Creation is God's sacred gift, entrusted to our care. In the Hebrew Bible, 'shalom' or peace, represents a far deeper idea that extends beyond the absence of conflict to the full restoration of broken relationships between God, ourselves, the human worldwide family, and the rest of Creation. This deep interconnectedness makes peace both essential and fragile.

"Then justice will dwell in the wilderness and righteousness abide in the fruitful field" (Isaiah 32:16).

Peace with Creation requires proactive steps. repentance and restorative justice. We need to repair broken relationships: between humans and Earth, humans and other creatures, and PEACEJesus taught



September 2nd Meeting Darnhall and Wettenhall W.I. Merseyside and Cheshire Blood Bikes.

As ever we opened the meeting with 'Jerusalem' and then went straight into the talk for the evening. It was an excellent presentation from Steve Hunter, one of their riders and speakers, full of enthusiasm, knowledge and dedication to this wonderful charity. None of the back-office staff or drivers receive any payment for their work, they are all volunteers. You may well have seen the Blood Bikes as you travel around our area or across the country. Each group is a separate charity, but they work together to take blood, breast milk, emergency prescriptions and equipment across the whole country. The breast milk bank at the Countess of Chester Hospital is the largest milk bank in the country and milk is distributed to all parts of the UK if there is a shortage for a premature baby at any hospital. The only thing that they do not carry for the NHS are organs for transport. If a package has to travel to areas far from Merseyside, the regional groups create a relay so that drivers do not have to complete the whole round journey themselves. The groups are not part of the NHS, but a charity which supports it, with absolutely no cost to the NHS, saving many hundreds of thousands of pounds each year. Each group raises all of its own funds, the local group aided by the generosity of motorbike and car companies and dealerships. They do not receive any government support. In recent years the local group has purchased four cars to use for the carriage of larger pieces of equipment and use when the outside temperature is below 3 degrees centigrade. It's more dangerous to drive a motorcycle in icy conditions. The talk was most interesting and full of surprising details. The Blood Bikers collection box received well deserved donations because we were so impressed with its valuable work for the NHS. Another excellent evening for all those members present.

Favourite Hymns; For all The Saints

In October many families, schools and children, start to plan their Halloween parties and 'Trick or Treating' fancy dress walks through their neighbourhood. This way of marking Halloween has been a long-standing custom in the USA for October 31st, but much more recent on this side of the Atlantic, however, the Christian church has marked the 1st of November, All Saints Day, since the ninth century! So, it is not surprising that there are hymns specially dedicated to this celebration of all the Saints on Earth and those in Heaven. The hymn 'For All The Saints' was written by William Walsham How [1823 - 1897] in 1864 and published in 'Hymns for the Saint's Days and Other Hymns'. William Walsham How was born in Shrewsbury and educated at Shrewsbury School, Wadham College, Oxford and University College Durham. He became the Rector at Whittington in Shropshire, remaining there for 28 years. During his time there he wrote around 50 hymns and eventually became the Bishop of Wakefield. He was known for his work with poor and industrial workers. 'For all the Saints' was a processional hymn and originally called 'A Cloud of Witnesses'. It celebrates the communion of saints, those who have died and live in eternal rest, and those who are living as Christians in the church. The author drew on writing throughout the bible, including Revelation, Hebrews, Corinthians and Matthew. Together these passages call on us to look to Heaven for inspiration here on Earth. It tells of saints living holy, faithful and spiritual lives before receiving their 'Crown of Gold' and joining the saints forever. The battle with evil is over for them. The hymn was sung to the tune 'Sarum' by Joseph Barnby until 1906, when Ralph Vaughan Williams wrote the tune Sine Nomine [meaning 'without name'] in reference to the fact

that only God knows the names of all the saints. Charles Villiers Stamford wrote a tune 'Engelberg' for the hymn, but it never gained popularity, although it is used for several other hymns. Ralph Vaughan Williams [1872 - 1958] was born in Gloucestershire, a great-grandson of Josiah Wedgwood and great nephew of Charles Darwin. He was influenced by writers such as Shakespeare, Blake and Bunyan to write an incredible range of music. These include ballets, symphonies, secular and religious vocal music and operas. His most famous piece is probably 'The Lark Ascending'. He was offered a Knighthood, but refused it, accepting an Order of Merit in 1935. He is buried in Westminster Abbey. Two inspirational men wrote this hymn to be an inspiration to us as we move into the darker evenings and need an uplifting hymn to see us all through the Autumn and into a cloud of saints.

Gift a pre-loved Smartphone

Goal:

To gift 100 pre-loved smartphones to Community Wireless Networks to support their work in providing access to the internet for underserved rural communities in the northern districts of Malawi.

Access to the internet means access to education, to healthcare, to information that supports subsistence farmers, and connects small businesses.

Overview:

Barros and Waliko are co-founders of Community Wireless Networks, a charitable organisation based in Karonga, Malawi. They are highly skilled Malawian IT specialists who were educated and trained in South Africa. They have now returned home to support their own communities by providing connectivity to the internet, access to digital devices and digital literacy for underserved rural communities. I have known them both for over 5 years, and supported their inspirational work whilst I was living in Malawi, and now from the UK.

Their approach is always empowerment of individuals and local communities because they understand that this is the only way to provide sustainable solutions. They have worked with a number of sponsors to connect over 100 rural schools and community centres. Given the difficulties of terrain and lack of resources, this is massive!!

Before providing the infrastructure for a network connection, they engage with community leaders and ask them to form a committee who will take responsibility for the fair use, security and maintenance of the equipment. After deployment they provide training to nominated community members to ensure longevity. Some of their other initiatives include digital literacy workshops for children and young adults; training and work experience for students from local technical colleges; supporting schools by providing guidance on digital education and platforms to enable the sharing of teaching resources.

Why do they need smartphones?

Whilst they have been very successful in providing the infrastructure for internet connectivity, an ongoing challenge is that so many people in the rural communities do not have access to devices to connect.

Community Wireless Networks would like to be able to provide these devices and make them affordable, as the vast majority of people do not have the means to buy them. Their approach is to offer a barter system whereby individuals can exchange a chicken (or other small offering) for a smartphone.

By providing an exchange, this empowers people to take ownership and adds value to the device. The chicken can then be sold or used for breeding and any profits from this are reinvested to provide funding to purchase more devices.

By gifting 100 smartphones, we can support Community Wireless Networks to give access to the internet to more people, both now and in the future. Thank you!!

Secure your phone before donating:

Backup your data – remove your SIM and micro SD card (if installed) – sign out of all accounts – perform a Factory Reset (open Settings - search 'factory reset' – select to erase or factory reset all data). If you are unable to erase or carry out a factory reset, a trusted volunteer from the charity will carry this out for you before the phones are sent to Malawi.

Redundant phones can be left at The Vicarage or given to Tom Doyle.



Did Covid Change Communion for Ever?

Is the Common Cup Safe? What about self-intinction (dipping)?

Depending on your assessment of risk, the answer to those questions will be very different. For some, the practice of receiving wine from the common cup is as natural now as it was before the Covid Pandemic paused the practice. For others, this feels a dangerous practice, and they continue to receive Communion in one kind only, simply receiving the bread. The decision we come to is up to us. We need to weigh the risks ourselves, and make our decision, but 5 years on from the Pandemic, it is worth pausing to see what the science says.

I am grateful to my colleague, Fr John Leal from St Michael's Coppenhall for passing on an article by Rev Matthew S C Olver, Ph.D, Executive Director and Publisher, The Living Church Foundation which can be found at:- It's Time to Retire Intinction: An Open Letter to the Bishops of The Episcopal Church - The Living Church

Olver begins with 2 clear statements, both scientifically proven:-

- 1. The use of the common cup poses a negligible risk, and
- 2. The practice of self-intinction is the least sanitary method by which one can receive the Sacrament.

The Common Cup

A review of scientific literature by the American National Institutes of Health found that: "Researchers have performed experiments, through which volunteers were asked to drink sacramental wine that contained 14.5% of alcohol from a common silver communion cup or chalice. Remarkably, the number of pathogens located in the rim of the chalice was found considerably low. The authors concluded that the risk of the transmission of the infection through a common communion cup is negligible. Furthermore, rotation of the chalice was ineffective in reducing bacterial colonisation. Wiping the rim of the chalice with a cloth reduced bacterial counts by 90%."

The same institute also found that that there was no scientific data to support the transmission of Covid through the use of the Common Cup at Communion.

Intinction (dipping the wafer)

Science has also shown that:

"Intinction provides no additional protection from germs than a common cup. If the person dipping the bread in the wine touches the wine at all, intinction is necessarily more likely to transmit bacteria and pathogens than a common cup. This is because of the high likelihood of bacteria, particularly from faecal matter under the fingernails. has an exponentially higher likelihood of passing dangerous bacteria"

"If safety is the principal concern, the safest method is to receive bread only from someone whose hands have been sanitised."

Conclusions

In considering the science more fully than is possible here, Olver concludes that:- It is entirely safe to drink from the Common Cup, provided the cup is silver, the wine is at least 14.5% proof and the cup is wiped between administrations. These practices are followed in the churches of the Cross Country Parishes.

It is not safe for Communicants to intinct (dip) the wafer into the chalice themselves. Communicants hands should come nowhere near the rim of the chalice when receiving Communion.

Recipe

Bramble Jelly

The hedgerows are full of blackberries at the moment, so try making this Bramble Jelly.

Ingredients

Method

- 4lbs or 2 Kgs of blackberries
- ₫ ¾ pt or 450 mls of water
- a 1lb or 450 grams of sugar to every pint or 600mls of blackberry juice

Enjoy



- Put the blackberries in a pan with the water and lemon juice and simmer until tender.
 - Pour into a muslin jelly bag (or old pillowcase) and leave to drip overnight. Do not squeeze the bag or the finished jelly will be cloudy.
- The next day, measure the juice and bring to the boil. Add 1 lb/450grams warm sugar for every pint of juice. Stir until the sugar has dissolved. Boil rapidly until setting point is reached which should take about ten minutes.
- Test with a jam thermometer to see if it has reached 105 degrees centigrade or 220 degrees Fahrenheit. If you haven't got a thermometer test for jelling on a cold saucer.

Pour the jelly into hot dry jars and cover, then label

Enjoy on your toast at breakfast time or on a crumpet for tea.

Worleston WI

Worleston's 87th birthday meeting was held on Wednesday 10th September. Our invited speaker for the evening was Nick Birchall from the Cheese Shop, Hospital Street, Nantwich.

Nick spoke about the history of cheese-making in Cheshire and especially in the Nantwich area from before the Romans invaded. Cheshire was positioned in the perfect spot for cheese making as we have plenty of salt, grass fed cows producing high quality milk, wood from forests to burn and heat the milk and a ready supply of rennet, from calves.

Romans took back with them the skills of cheese-making into Europe and Italy, where the original Cheshire Cheese recipe was adapted.

Henry VIII halted cheese-making by monks in Abbeys with the dissolution of the Catholic Church and many monks fled to France, starting their own cheese-making there.

Nick had brought three different Cheshire made cheeses for us to sample and explained that it is better to buy small quantities of cheese, often, as it soon loses its freshness.

All three were delicious, but we found that there were differences in taste and texture during our tasting session.




